We all completed our schooling in Port Lincoln and still maintain close friendships there despite none of us living there for some time. As you may all be aware, efforts to seek access continues assisted by Geoff and Brian Tattersall and myself, for access/visiting rights to the Radium Hill cemetery. We met with Dept Officials on 28th March 25 who are being helpful within their delegation to do so, The issue remains that a lease holder is declining access. Following those discussions with the Dept it is now proposed to refer the matter to the responsible minister. And as such there remains no public access of any sort to Radium Hill.

RADIUM HILL MUSEUM VISIT BY JIMI 5 April 25

I went up to Peterborough to revisit the Radium Hill Museum with the aim of photographing the existing exhibit and attempting to start an inventory of the exhibit contents.

It is great to see the care and responsibility that the Peterborough Railway Museum Board and staff have for our exhibit.

For those who are not aware the Radium Hill Museum continues to be located within the Peterborough Railway Museum and will be for the foreseeable future where their security and cameras can help protect the exhibit.

The staff have informed us of the disappointing loss of an item/s previously displayed on the wall of the museum that was removed quite openly by persons who claimed to be family members of an ex-radium hill resident who donated the item/s freely to the museum.


This has led to the exhibit being locked and only being opened when supervised tours are occurring. This is currently the only way the donated items can be protected and respected.

Visitors and family are reminded like all museums of historical mementos and artifacts of a particular era, that they are donated for preservation and memory of that time. It is this respect that allows RSL museums with important personal donated items, important not only to the families who have donated them but also for history, allowing a story to be told through their display. I feel we should as the Radium Hill community have the same duty and respect of our items donated by individuals wanting their story to be remembered.

I lived in Radium Hill from 1956 to 1959 and was at boarding school in Adelaide during that time so all my memories were when I was home during the school holidays. I had a job at Millings cool drink factory...a tin shed next to Penngily's garage and spent the day washing dirty cool drink bottles. George would come in after work and refill them and deliver them to the outlets where customers could "Buy Millings and save Shillings" He was only competing with Coca-Cola!! When our supply of bottles was running low George would "find" a source of dirty bottles which needed to be washed ready for refilling. Most of the bottles were really dirty and

needed a lot of scrubbing to clean them and bring them up to scratch. However, if any bottles had dead mice in them, I was instructed not to clean them and throw the bottle in the bin. That was our "OCC Health and Safety" programme.

I enjoyed working at Radium Hill and look forward to reminiscing with ex residents in the future

My father Ken Glasson was the chief geologist and we lived at Radium Hill in 1952 and 1953. We had the 3rd house to be occupied by a family. The first house accommodated nurses from Far West Mission ran by the Presbyterian Church.

Mum, Jim (born in January 1952) and I followed Dad to Radium Hill in August 1952 once the house was finished and I started schooling 1953. Our groceries were delivered each week by truck and our meat was also delivered weekly in a large calico bag with our name on it. The water was brackish, impossible to lather and bought in by a road tanker and we had to be very economical with it. On Sundays we usually packed lunch and friend into the Land Rover for a picnic in a dry sandy creek bed. Pat Colley was Dad's draftswoman and a family friend.

RADIUM HILL....1956-1959 Evolves a kaleidoscope of memories for me even though those years were, in the scheme of things, such a minute number in my life. Living on a corner block on the Avenue with little in the back yard except castor oil bushes and dirt which quickly turned to dust when the ferocious wind blew. I would look with envy at Mrs Pengilly's wonderful array of plants and flowers. Living opposite the Andrews family I think of 5 boys was an experience itself. Walking past Sergeant Colligans house making sure to be doing the right thing. The AIM hospital with it nurses dressed in uniform complete with head gear was

a place which I remember only visiting once.
Going to the post office to pickup verv

welcome mail. Walking up the hill to

with a towel slung over the shoulder

the swimming pool clad in bathers

and generally bare feet...beware of 3 cornered jacks. No hat nor sunscreen in those days. The excitement of going to the walk-in cinema, meeting friends along the way often with a bottle of water, not to drink but to cool the extremities of the body. Winter necessitated woolly hats and blankets. Summer was 'stinking hot' and Winter 'bitterly cold'. School was a walk across a paddock. Staff were Mr Raymond, Miss Cochran, Miss Wallace and my sister Miss Lambert. I, as a 12 year old was in class 6/7 where "the big boys" as I considered them, Rainer, Helmut and Spog hung out waiting until they turned 14 and eligible to enter the work force. They were a great help in winter as they were the wood monitors and appeared to spend most mornings chopping wood to keep the fires burning in the 4 classrooms. The older girls, including me would be sent down to assist the junior grade teachers with the reading and spelling for the littlies.

As there was no High School available the majority of children at 14 left school and began their working life. I was sent to boarding school and would travel by train to Adelaide each school term. The 11km spur line from the township to Cutana where it would connect to the Broken Hill train. Such excitement when anybody left the town as friends would congregate to say goodbye. Steam trains were the order of the day so it was not wise to put one's head out the window!

Such an eclectic group of people from many different countries with many different languages who generally appeared to meld together and enjoy the wide open spaces and the little outback town. Friendships were made so many years ago and are still continuing today.

DID YOU KNOW

- In 1906 A.J.Smith mistook a dark coloured ore for Tin and inadvertently made the first discovery of a radioactive material at Radium Hill .Later Sir Douglas Mawson identified uranium within the sample and named it davidite after the late Sir Edgeworth David
- Between 1949 -1952 S.A. Housing trust was commissioned to build approx.145 mostly prefabricated houses.
- In the 1950s, the AAEC took over operations to develop uranium for export, contributing to the Western alliance's nuclear capabilities during the Cold War.
- During the 1950s, uranium from Radium Hill was exported under agreements with the United Kingdom and United States to fuel their nuclear weapons programs.
- In the early 50's it was necessary to obtain an entry permit to enter Radium-Hill...does anvone remember before flying over Radium Hill township all the blinds on the aeroplane had to be pulled down...so secretive.
- In 1954 The Radium Hill Project was the first mining organization in Australia to take to court the matter of manning light air-leg mounted rock drills.
- 70 Years ago in 1955 there were 14 babies born at the AIM Hospital....a total of 117 babies were born between 1953 and 1961
- The 2006 re-union at the old townsite campground had a barbecue chop and sausage

- sizzle. You could buy a meal ticket for \$7 which consisted of 2 lamb chops, a couple of sausages, onions and bread on a plate.
- With a combination of 11 years of effort and 1000's of hours of voluntary labour the Radium Hill Museum was opened in 2007 in one of the outbuildings of Tikalina station. It is now housed at the Railway Museum in Peterborough and well worth the effort on visitina.
- After the township closed all buildings were sold and dismantled and the sites levelled. The "wet Canteen" was re-located to Yalata Labour Prison, the lockup to Olarv and the Golf Club shed to Yunta Hotel. Sheehan's store went to Cockburn and the Buff hall to Peterborough. Rumour has it one of the workshop buildings is now the yacht club at Andamooka. Wonder if any are still standing today.
- The Supper Cloth: 107 ladies paid 2 shillings each to have their signature embroidered onto a supper cloth. It is now framed and displayed at the museum at Peterborough.
- About 100 people were naturalised during their time living at Radium Hill
- 160 houses were built. 2. 3 and 4 bedrooms. Timber framed and asbestos clad. Cold in winter and very hot in Summer.
- The Catholic School was opened in February 1958 with 76 students.
- The Townsite and Cemetery are both individually Heritage listed in 2017.
